A Word from Our Pastor

The Fox's Trot

I had the chance to visit the Virginia Aquarium with my family this past Fourth of July. If I'm honest, I don't remember many of the marine biology facts. I do, however, remember learning that jellyfish poop out of their mouths—which is both disgusting and fascinating.

I couldn't name every fish we saw, nor could I say what fascinated me most. But, I do remember the feeling: wonder. A deep curiosity. A quiet reverence. I remember standing before massive glass windows, watching sharks glide, sea turtles rise, and stingrays fold through the water. There's a tunnel at the aquarium where you can stand beneath the sea creatures—and in that moment, I felt small. Which, given my size, is hard to come by.

It reminded me of standing on the edge of the ocean, unable to see the end – and hardly the beginning, listening to the waves roll in like they are the heartbeat of the earth. The sea is beautiful and calming—and at the same time, terrifying. It holds a power we don't fully understand.

It's easy to get used to living on the surface of life. We like what's visible, manageable, and safe. But real growth often happens in the deep places—the terrifying and unfamiliar ones. By sticking to the surface of life and faith, I wonder if we're missing the deeper current.

At the aquarium, I saw a tank of starfish. Did you know they don't have brains? They eat, move, and respond to their environment because of a neural system called ganglia. Don't ask me to explain it beyond that. But what stuck with me wasn't the biology—it was how easy they were to miss. Some were tucked into corners or blended into the walls.

That's how we experience most sea life: unseen and unknown. And yet, some of the most remarkable things in creation happen where eyes don't easily see—beneath the surface. Isn't that also how God often works in us?

The psalmist writes, "Deep calls to deep at the thunder of your cataracts; all your waves and your billows have gone over me." (Psalm 42:7)

That line—deep calls to deep—speaks to us. There's more to life than what we see at the surface. There's a whole other world beneath, waiting to be explored. But it's no wonder we tend to stay in the shallows. That's where we can stand. That's where we feel in control.

Yet Jesus never stayed in the shallows with people, did He? In Luke 5, when Jesus calls the disciples, He says, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch." Peter in protest says, "We've fished all night and caught nothing." In other words: "We already tried that. It didn't work." But Jesus wasn't just talking about fish. He was inviting Peter to trust again—to try again—even when it didn't make sense. That's where discipleship begins.

Many of us have stopped casting our nets, because life didn't go the way we hoped. Maybe prayer once brought us comfort, but lately it feels dry. Maybe a Bible study we joined felt awkward. Maybe the last retreat or small group didn't meet our expectations. So we sit on the dock. We stick with what's easy. We tell ourselves it's enough—but deep down, we're bored.

There's an old line about the Gospel of John: "It provides a place where a child can wade and an elephant can swim." That's the beauty of our faith. It holds space for simplicity and mystery. But only when we're willing to move beyond the surface.

At the aquarium, there's a boundary between us and the sea life. Glass keeps us safe. But it also keeps us distant. I overheard a child say to his mother, "That shark is a nice shark." She replied, "That's the only nice shark. That's why it's here. You have to be careful around all the others." That exchange stuck with me—not because it's entirely accurate, but because it reminded me of the fears we carry.

What are the things that keep us from going deeper? Fear of not knowing enough? Fear of being emotionally vulnerable? Fear of being judged? Fear that our questions or doubts disqualify us? Fear of being asked to change? Like sharks in the water, these fears circle us. They cause hesitation. They whisper, "Stay in the shallows. It's safer there." But, as an Easter people, we know that fear is not the final word.

In Matthew 14, Peter steps out of the boat and walks on water. A miracle! Until he sees the wind and waves—and starts to sink. He cries out, and Jesus immediately reaches for him. This reminds us that in the midst of fear, we must trust someone greater than our fear.

Maybe the reason the small groups or spiritual retreats haven't taken off in the way I'd hoped isn't because they're not needed. Maybe it's because we all need a reminder that these things are about deeper faith, not just programs. I'm not going to give up on these invitations. However, I am choosing to offer them differently—not as events on a calendar, but as responses to the deep.

Christ is calling all of us into the deep, beyond the surface. Let's press forward into the deeper things together.

The Art of Steady Support: Why Tempo Matters in Hymns

When a congregation sings a hymn, something sacred and communal happens. Voices unite, hearts lift, and the words of faith are carried on melody. What often goes unnoticed, however, is the steady hand guiding that experience—the organist. The organist is like a conductor, quietly setting the pace from the bench. One of the most important—and sometimes overlooked—aspects of this leadership is tempo. Tempo simply means the speed of the music, and getting it right makes all the difference in how the congregation sings. If a hymn is played too fast, singers can feel rushed and out of breath. If it's too slow, energy and meaning can drag. But when the tempo is just right and steady throughout, the congregation feels supported. Like a gentle current in a river, a steady tempo helps carry the voices naturally from phrase to phrase. Breathing is another key factor. Each line of a hymn is like a spoken sentence; it needs time to breathe at the end. A good tempo makes room for this, allowing singers to take in air and sing each phrase with intention and understanding. Some hymns, like "Holy, Holy," call for a stately and measured pace. Others, like "Rejoice, the Lord is King," come alive with a more buoyant rhythm. The organist must weigh the mood, text, and tune to find a tempo that fits both the hymn and the people singing it. It may seem simple, but maintaining a steady tempo isn't always easy. Acoustics, distractions, or even the size of the congregation can affect how things flow. But a skilled organist listens and adjusts, always aiming to serve the voice of the people. So next time you join in a hymn, take a moment to notice how the tempo feels. Is it calm and confident? Is it moving without hurry? That's no accident. Behind the scenes, the organist is helping every voice find its place, ensuring that the hymn becomes not just music, but a unified prayer.

If you are creating a will or updating your will consider one of two options to help in the mission of Gloria Dei Lutheran Church:

- 1. In your will you can state, "After all my bills are paid, I want 10 percent of my estate (a tithe) to go to Gloria Dei Lutheran Church."
- 2. You can make Gloria Dei Lutheran Church one of your children. By making the Church a beneficiary, meaning if you have two biological children, your estate would be split equally to your now three children one-third to Harvely, one-third to Marvely, and one-third to Gloria Dei Lutheran Church.






BRIGHTER FUTURES THROUGH EDUCATION

THE SITUATION

Education is the best path out of poverty. For every year a girl can stay in school, her earning potential as an adult soars by 20%. Yet poverty is the number one reason hundreds of millions of children globally do not attend school. In Sierra Leone, nearly 70% of women have no education at all - greatly limiting their earning potential and their ability to make informed decisions.





1 in 3 girls drops out of school by age 12

Half of 12- to 14-year-olds work 28+ hours a week

Both of 13-year-old Salamatu Conteh's parents are ill and can no longer care for her. This has put Salamatu at a higher risk of dropping out of school.

Luckily, her aunt and uncle were able to take her in and have made her education a priority, despite having four of their own children and limited resources.



With your incredible support, this year we launched a new pilot program to keep children - and especially girls - in school. We use an innovative technology to monitor school attendance, identify out-of-school girls, and provide monthly cash transfers so children can afford an education. Then we address non-financial barriers by connecting girls and their families with health care, disability services, counseling and other support so they can better care for themselves.


