A Word from Our Pastor

The Fox's Trot

Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you.

(Ephesians 4:32, NRSVUE)

By now, we are likely finished with turkey and heavy meals. We might even be finished with some of our family. The hectic pace of November and December—the gatherings, the commitments, the expectations—may have left us frustrated by other people's behavior.

Perhaps a neighbor said something that cut you to the core simply because they were in a bad mood. Maybe a coworker was overly critical of work you had put real effort into. Or a family member snapped at everyone for no apparent reason, showing their true colors at exactly the wrong moment. Whatever the situation, we often judge these behaviors at face value, assuming the other person is simply being difficult. Yet what we see on the surface is usually only a small part of what is going on in another person's life.

Recently, my son and I watched—again—the movie *A Man Called Otto*. This film offers a helpful lens for understanding how poor behavior often runs deeper than what we initially encounter. Otto, the main character, is cantankerous, rigid, and nearly impossible to please. His neighbors have written him off as nothing more than a grumpy old man.

But as the story unfolds, we begin to see what lies beneath Otto's hardened exterior. There is deep grief over lost love, profound loneliness, and a lifetime marked by disappointment and loss. Otto's grumpiness is not the whole story; it is a shell, protecting his wounded heart. His harsh behavior masks deep human pain.

In the same way, the difficult behaviors we encounter in others—especially the most frustrating ones—are often rooted in experiences we know nothing about. This does not excuse hurtful behavior, but it does help us understand it more clearly.

With that in mind, I want to invite you to pause the next time you run into a “grump.” Resist the urge to take their behavior personally. Consider that something deeper may be at play.

Instead of reacting with frustration, try responding with grace.

Here are four practices that can help us do just that:

First, when someone frustrates you, pause and ask yourself: What might be driving this behavior? Considering possibilities such as stress, past hurts, fear, or grief can shift our response from judgment to understanding.

Second, take a few minutes each day to reflect or journal about interactions that challenged you. Ask: How might I respond with patience or kindness instead of irritation next time?

Third, think about someone whose behavior regularly annoys you. Imagine three possible reasons for their actions—none of which are about you. Reflect on how viewing them through this lens might soften your response.

Fourth, focus intentionally on the good around you. Each day, notice what you are grateful for and offer one small act of kindness. Over time, this practice helps us resist sliding into negativity or grumpiness ourselves.

Otto's story reminds us that everyone we encounter is carrying burdens we cannot see. Our Christian calling is not to excuse harmful or abusive behavior. Grace does not mean ignoring real harm. Rather, we are called to respond with kindness, patience, and empathy—while also maintaining healthy boundaries. Sometimes grace includes speaking up when those boundaries are crossed.

So, is there someone in your life you've written off as “difficult”? Could you pause and imagine what might lie beneath the surface? Could you respond with patience—or even a small act of kindness?

Like Otto's neighbors, we may discover that empathy and compassion have the power not only to change someone else's life, but to transform our own as well.

Leading from Behind: The Organist as Worship Partner

Most people don't see the organist during worship. Often seated behind the congregation or high in a loft, the organist isn't in the spotlight. But their role in shaping the singing is vital.

Think of the organist not as a performer but as a worship partner—someone who quietly supports and encourages the congregation's voice. This leadership is subtle but powerful. The organist's job isn't to show off or dominate the room. It's to serve. That means playing in a way that lifts the congregation, not overshadows it. When hymn playing is done well, the organ becomes an extension of the people's praise—steady, warm, and welcoming.

A good organist listens carefully during hymns. If the congregation begins to slow down or rush ahead, the organist adjusts—sometimes even in the middle of a verse. It's a dance of sorts, with the organist gently guiding without being rigid. This sensitivity helps everyone stay together and feel confident.

Another key element is phrasing—how the music breathes. Just like speaking in full sentences, hymns should be sung with natural rises and falls, with time to breathe. A thoughtful organist shapes the music to match the phrasing of the text, helping the congregation sing with both heart and clarity. This behind-the-scenes leadership transforms hymn singing into a deeper act of unity. It encourages participation from everyone, regardless of musical skill. The congregation becomes not just an audience, but a choir of worshipers.

So, while the organist may be out of sight, their role is central. Through tempo, registration, phrasing, and attentiveness, they help create a space where the congregation's song becomes vibrant, grounded, and alive. Next time you sing a hymn, remember: you're not singing alone—you have a partner in praise, just a few feet behind the scenes.

It's a light, fun read, so it would be a perfect time to come join us to see what a book club is all about. Here's a synopsis of the story.

In the year 1903, Cairo is buzzing with intrigue as Amelia Peabody finds herself embroiled in new adventures. The story opens with a chilling message: "Stay away from tomb Twenty-Al." This warning sets the tone for Amelia's ninth escapade. The requests for help vary as Amelia's old friend seeks her expertise. This friend's husband is now enamored with a spiritualist, stirring up tension among acquaintances. Shortly thereafter, an urgent plea arrives from an expatriate colonel. His daughter faces threats from an unknown enemy, escalating the stakes for Amelia and her family. Amelia's son, Ramses, now a spirited teenager, brings his own complications to this already chaotic family dynamic. His headstrong nature guarantees that his mother will find her hair turning white due to worry. A significant turning point occurs when Amelia dreams of a large cat, an Egyptian symbol of fortune. Ironically, luck appears to be in short supply for the Peabodys.

Then on **March 9, at 7:00 p.m.**, we'll gather at the home of Diane Washburn to discuss the book "Elanore Oliphant is Completely Fine," by Gail Honeyman. It's a thought-provoking book and should lead to a great discussion. Come join us!

No one's ever told Eleanor that life should be better than fine. Meet Eleanor Oliphant: She struggles with appropriate social skills and tends to say exactly what she's thinking. Nothing is missing in her carefully timetabled life of avoiding social interactions, where weekends are punctuated by frozen pizza, vodka, and phone chats with Mummy.

But everything changes when Eleanor meets Raymond, the bumbling and deeply unhygienic IT guy from her office. When she and Raymond together save Sammy, an elderly gentleman who has fallen on the sidewalk, the three become the kinds of friends who rescue one another from the lives of isolation they have each been living. And it is Raymond's big heart that will ultimately help Eleanor find the way to repair her own profoundly damaged one.

From the Principal

Happy New Year! It is hard to believe we are already entering the second semester of the school year. The Christmas season was a joyful and busy time at Gloria Dei, and our students did a wonderful job during their Christmas programs. From our toddlers to our teens, students blessed families, friends, and staff by sharing the true meaning of Christmas through their beautiful songs. A heartfelt thank you to our music team—Dr. Spence, Ms. Schubert, and Mrs. Barefoot. Your dedication, talent, and guidance are deeply appreciated.

We are thrilled to announce the completion of the final playground structure on the Willow Oaks campus. The Denali Wall features six Rock Climbers, two Arch Leaf Climbers, and two Hex Climbers, providing space for up to 35 students to play at once. Designed to encourage imaginative play, the structure also promotes strength, coordination, and physical development.

A special thank you goes to Rashard Russell, Mike Riley, and the Stewards of Gloria Dei Church for their dedication and hard work. Despite several weather-related setbacks, they remained committed to bringing this project to life.

Students and staff are already enjoying the new addition, and the kindergarten classes, in particular, have been having a blast with the new equipment. Check out the photos below to see them in action!



Soon, we will begin registration for the 2026–2027 school year. By the end of the first week of March, families should receive a registration packet for the upcoming school year. If you do not receive your packet, please contact the school office at (757) 851-6292, and we will be happy to mail one to you.

Registration for current students and members of our congregation begins on Monday, March 16. Registration will open to the public on Monday, March 23. If your child currently attends Gloria Dei and you plan for your child to return next year, I strongly encourage you to take advantage of advance registration during the week of March 16–20 to reserve your child's placement. Please note that returning students must re-register each year, as registration is an annual process.

Each year's program is thoughtfully designed to build a strong foundation through sequential skill development. As students progress from one grade level to the next, programs expand to provide a broader range of academic, social, and enrichment opportunities.

Children in our Toddler/Two-Year-Old classes may enroll in a full-day program beginning with the summer program. These students enjoy a positive first-school experience through age-appropriate activities, art projects, games, music, library time, and chapel. Students must be at least 16 months old on their entrance date to attend.

At the preschool level, we offer a half-day academic program, with the option of hourly or full-time childcare before and/or after school if needed. Preschoolers participate in weekly themed units, early alphabet and phonics instruction, counting and number concepts, art, children’s literature, learning games, music, chapel, physical education, and library. Preschool provides children with opportunities to develop friendships, learn conflict resolution skills, and grow socially and academically. Preschool students must be potty-trained and be three years old by November 30, 2026.

Students advancing from preschool to prekindergarten engage in pre-reading and language development through programs such as *Handwriting Without Tears Word*, *Scholastic News*, and *Mortimer Moose* for alphabet and phonics instruction, as well as *Handwriting Without Tears Math*. In addition to engaging classroom activities and games, prekindergarten students enjoy weekly P.E., music, chapel, library, and hands-on science instruction. Every other week, students participate in nutrition lessons with Chef Combo and visit the computer lab for educational software activities.

Kick Start Kindergarten is designed for students who are age-eligible for kindergarten but may need additional readiness support, students repeating prekindergarten, or advanced students entering prekindergarten. Eligibility requires a screening and a teacher recommendation.

The Willow Oaks campus provides all the essential facilities needed to support our elementary students, including a computer lab, library, art and music rooms, science room, P.E. athletic field, playground, infirmary, and administrative offices. Our elementary program reflects a strong tradition of academic excellence in a Christian environment, with an emphasis on the mental, spiritual, physical, emotional, and social development of each student. The curriculum builds strong foundational skills in phonics, reading comprehension, spelling, math, and writing, while offering a rich and engaging resource schedule that includes weekly art, extended computer time, P.E., Spanish, chapel, library, music, chorus, and S.T.E.M. science lab experiences.

Our middle school program is also located on the Willow Oaks campus. The upcoming school year will be our final year offering eighth grade, bringing our middle school program to a meaningful conclusion. Middle school students transition between classes for core subjects including literature, grammar, composition, math, science, and social studies, while also participating in a wide range of enrichment opportunities such as health, physical education, art, CSI, computers, Stop Motion Animation, chapel, library, music, and more. In addition, high school credit courses are offered in Algebra I, Geometry, and Spanish I.

It is truly remarkable what students can achieve through a strong academic curriculum, enriching resource classes, a spiritual foundation that reinforces values and morals, a nurturing and caring environment, and a strong partnership between home and school. Now more than ever, it is essential for students to develop not only a solid educational foundation but also a firm grounding in moral and ethical standards. Children learn values through example, guidance, and experience. The environment you provide for your child today will influence them for a lifetime, and we are honored to partner with you on your child’s educational journey.

Happy New Year! We are closing in on semester exams and the end of the first semester. Eighth grade is off to a busy start this January, and will soon be reviewing for semester exams in all core subjects.

The students have full schedules, with core classes of Language Arts, Physical Science, American History, Math and Spanish, as well as resource classes in Art, Music, Computers, Physical Education, Bible Study, Novel Study, and assorted quarterly elective classes.

The students continue to participate in the AR reading program in middle school. In fact, every single middle school student met, or exceeded, their reading goal for the first quarter!

Eighth grade math offerings consist of either Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, or Geometry. Algebra I and Geometry are both taught at the high school level, and students have the opportunity to earn one year of high school math credit with the successful completion of each of these courses. The students are handling their challenging course load well!

The eighth grade Spanish 1B students have been diligently working to learn Spanish this year. Spanish 1B is an elective high school level class and is quite academically challenging. If the student completes Spanish 1A and 1B with success, the student

may earn high school credit. Ms. Vaught shared that she is very proud of her students and the work that they have done thus far.

The students have had some fun this year also! They especially enjoy ‘Ice Cream Wednesdays’ and ‘Special Lunch’ days. Our annual Thanksgiving Feast was a wonderful event as well. To celebrate Christmas, they had a mug exchange, drank hot cocoa, and watched a holiday movie during our fun ‘Mugs and Movies’ event. The students also enjoyed a field trip to the HUB 757 Performing Arts Center in Suffolk to see the Hispanic Flamenco Ballet in the fall.

Eighth graders made cards for veterans at the VA Hospital in honor of Veteran’s Day and for Christmas. They also participated in the food drive for H.E.L.P. during Fall Festival week. They played the bells and sang beautifully for their Christmas program in December.

We look forward to the remainder of our school year. The second semester promises to be just as full of learning, activities, and special events. Before we know it, the eighth-grade students will be celebrating their very special Gloria Dei graduation in June.

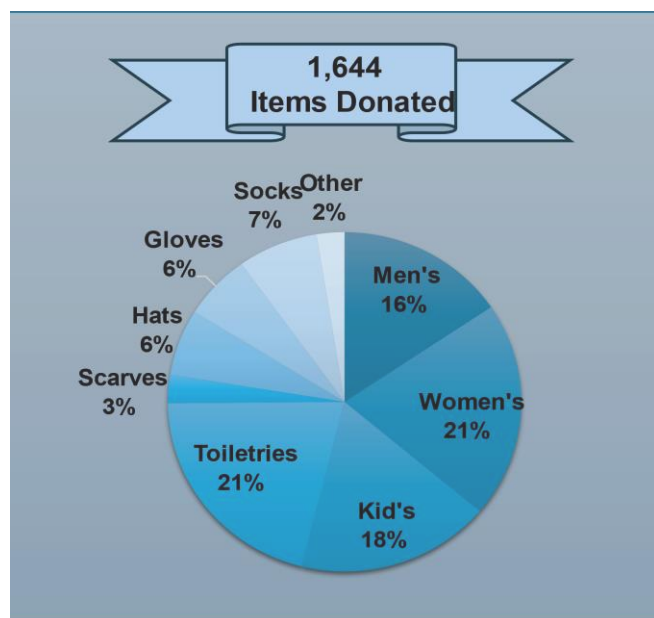
